Call for Entries. Competition Deadline February 12, 1996

Entries must be received at the League office by 5 p.m. or postmarked (not metered) by this date. There will be no exceptions to this deadline.

The League cannot be responsible for entries received by mail after the jury date, which will be approximately a week after the deadline.

Young architects and designers are invited to submit work to the fourteenth annual Young Architects Competition. Projects of all types, either theoretical or real and executed in any medium, are welcome. The jury will select work for presentation in public forums and an exhibition at the Architectural League in April-May, 1996. Winners will receive a cash prize of \$500. A poster of the winning entries will be published and distributed nationally. The Young Architects Forum is an annual competition, series of lectures and exhibition organized by the Architectural League and its Young Architects Committee. The Forum was established to recognize specific works of high quality and to encourage the exchange of ideas among young people who might not otherwise have a forum.

Entrants may submit work done independently, as an employee, or as a teacher. Entrants must be ten years or less out of graduate or undergraduate school; students are not eligible for this competition. Work completed The competition theme, and the stream of questions that it generates, en as an employee must be accompanied by a letter from a principal in the requested, within which the work might be defined and considered. firm stating that the entrant can be given sole credit for the work submitted. The competition is open to residents of the United States, Canada, and Mexico only.

What is form in architecture, that it could seem to have such diverse genealogies?

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

A single portfolio, which may include several projects, must be submitted in a binder no larger that 9" x 12". The binder may not contain more than thirty double-sided pages. Models, slides, and transparencies will not be accepted. Videos must be in a 1/2" VHS format and no longer than five minutes. Entries must be received at the League office by 5 p.m. February 12, 1996 or postmarked (not metered) by that date.

Each entrant must submit an entry fee of \$20.

Each submission must include an entry form. Insert form, intact, into an unsealed envelope attached to the inside back cover of the submission. To maintain anonymity, no identification of the entrant may appear on any part of the submission, except on the entry form.

Portfolios will be returned by mail only if a self-addressed envelope with postage is also enclosed. The Architectural League assumes no liability for Greenwall Foundation, Artemide, Inc. and Tischler und Sohn for the Young original drawings. The League will take every precaution to return submissions intact, but can assume no responsibility for loss or damage.

Winning entrants will be notified by March 1, 1996.
