Over the past forty years, Weems has created a body of work using photographs, text, fabric, audio, digital images, installation, and video. In the lecture, Weems will discuss her innovative explorations of history, identity, and cultural narratives. The recipient of the 2022 National Medal of Arts, Weems has made significant contributions to the visual arts and beyond, using her practice to address the most pressing social issues of our time. Her work challenges existing power structures and reimagines how Black identity is represented in art and society.

A now annual event, the re-launch of this important lecture series reflects The Architectural League's long standing commitment to fostering interdisciplinary dialogue around architecture, art, and the built environment. Carrie Mae Weems's exploration of how power, culture, and community are represented through artistic practices will resonate deeply with audiences interested in the intersections of art, activism, and urbanism.

"[Weems's] work, from the *Kitchen Table Series*, to *Roaming*, to the multidisciplinary installation and profound 2021 convening for *The Shape of Things*, to the *Painting the Town* series made in the wake of the murder of George Floyd, situates our lives as social and political beings. Space is not neutral, but rather it is key to orienting human relationships at the domestic and urban scale—in the rooms, monuments, and stage sets she records and creates."

Wilson**, chair of Architecture and African American and African Diaspora Studies and the Nancy and George Rupp Professor of Architecture, Planning and Preservation at Columbia University GSAPP.

About Carrie Mae Weems

Since the 1980s, Weems's work has been seen around the world in exhibitions that include *Reflections for Now* at Barbican Art Gallery in London and *The Evidence of Things Not Seen*, organized by Württembergischer Kunstverein Stuttgart and shown at Kunstmuseum Basel. Her panoramic video installation *The Shape of Things*, shown almost continuously in museum venues since its 2021 premiere at the Park Avenue Armory, was on view in New York City at Gladstone Gallery through November 9, 2024. In addition to her solo work, Weems has led multiple collective public art projects and multidisciplinary performances, collaborating with activists, artists, students, musicians, poets, theorists, and writers.

Weems's many accolades include a MacArthur Foundation fellowship, a U.S. State Department's Medal of Arts, a Joseph Hazen Rome Prize Fellowship from the American Academy in Rome, and the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation's Lifetime Achievement Award. Her work is included in the collections of The Metropolitan Museum of Art; Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; The Museum of Modern Art (MoMA); The Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles; and Tate Modern, among others. Weems works and lives in Syracuse, New York.

About Mabel O. Wilson

Mabel O. Wilson is the Nancy and George Rupp Professor of Architecture, Planning and Preservation and chair of African American and African Diaspora Studies at Columbia University GSAPP. With her practice Studio&, she was a member of the design team for the Memorial to Enslaved Laborers at the University of Virginia. In 2021, she co-curated the exhibition *Reconstructions: Architecture and Blackness in America* at the Museum of Modern Art. Among her many publications, Wilson most recently co-edited the volume *Race and Modern Architecture: From the Enlightenment to Today* (University of Pittsburgh Press, 2020).
